TAX PAYMENT DUE DATES

- ❖ First installment and/or payments in full are due on or before **January 31, 2018**
- ❖ All personal property taxes and special assessments are due by **January 31, 2018**
- ❖ All taxes of \$100 or less per parcel must be paid in full by **January 31, 2018**

All taxes paid after January 31, 2018, must be paid at the Wood County Courthouse, payable to Wood County Treasurer.

Dog license fees must be on a separate check.

Taxes must be receipted in 2017 to be deductible on 2017 income taxes. Our office will be closed on Monday, December 25; Tuesday, December 26; and Monday, January 1, 2018. Mailed payments that are postmarked on or before December 31, 2017 will be receipted in 2017.

PAYMENT IN PERSON

Taxes may be paid by cash, check, debit or credit card (a fee is charged by Gov Pay to process the debit or credit card transaction) at the Municipal Building at 2410 48th Street South during the following business hours:

Friday
8 a.m. – 12 p.m.

THE TREASURER'S OFFICE WILL BE CLOSED FROM 1-2 P.M. DAILY

TOWN DROPBOX (Not for US mail or 2nd Half Tax Payments)

A secured drop box has been installed at the Municipal Building entrance. Use this mailbox to leave correspondence for any town office or official, permit application, citation forfeiture, full or first-half tax payment in December or January ONLY.

NOTE: PAYMENTS AFTER JANUARY 31, 2018 ARE NOT COLLECTED BY THE TOWN TREASURER AND ARE PAYABLE TO THE WOOD COUNTY TREASURER

GARBAGE AND RECYCLING INFORMATION

The Town of Grand Rapids contracts with Advanced Disposal for the roadside pickup of our garbage and recycling items. Our contract provides "curbside collection service for the collection of **not more than (4) 30 gallon bags or cans of residential waste** from residential units one time per week", and must be placed curbside the night before, or prior to 5 a.m. on the scheduled collection day. Advanced Disposal is not required to pick up residential waste in excess of this amount. An excess of this allowed amount may result in some of your garbage not being picked up by Advanced Disposal. The resident is responsible for properly disposing of the excess amount.

Recycling items contracted to be picked up include: Consumer commingled materials such as aluminum cans, container glass, corrugated cardboard, mixed papers, newspapers, tin cans and most #1 through #7 plastic items and aseptic containers.

UPDATED RECYCLING ITEMS ACCEPTED IN ADDITION TO #1 AND #2s:

#3 THROUGH #7 PLASTICS:

- Food & beverage containers, cat litter containers, ice cream pails, 5-gallon pails, medicine/pill containers, bakery containers, flower pots or trays, yogurt or cottage cheese containers, cups & tubs, clear and rigid clam shell packaging.

ASEPTIC CONTAINERS:

- Cartons or boxes used for juice, milk, soy milk, ice cream and broths.

PLASTIC ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED:

- #1 Brown plastic bottles
- #6 polystyrene foam ("Styrofoam"): Egg cartons, hot beverage cups, plates, formed packing pieces, packing peanuts
- Motor oil containers
- Plastic film, shrink wrap and bags (all #'s)
- CD cases
- Vinyl items such as windows, siding, etc.

COMMON RECYCLING MISTAKES

PLASTIC BAGS – Most common item in the bin or cart that should NOT be there, and can be most detrimental – causes many problems in the recycling sorter. Please take them to stores where there are specially designated bins for plastic bags – this includes grocery, newspaper, bread, produce, and dry cleaning bags; air pillows, case wrap, napkins, paper towels, bathroom tissue and diaper wrap packaging.

TAKE-OUT CONTAINERS, DONUT & PIZZA BOXES – These should only be recycled if free of food waste, residue, grease, etc.

PAPER COFFEE CUPS – Often thought of as a better alternative to Styrofoam, paper cups pose issues to recycling, as well as the plastic coating applied to prevent leaking.

SHREDDED PAPER – Shredding paper reduces its size so dramatically that it ends up mixed with the residue or glass at the recycling facility instead, making it unable to be recycled.

HOUSEHOLD GLASS – Items like window panes, mirrors, light bulbs and dishes are dangerous and should be left out of your recycling. Light bulbs can be recycled at many hardware and home improvement stores. Dishes, if not broken, can be donated to local charities.

WET PAPER – Wet paper can make recycling difficult or impossible. Wet paper should be discarded with the trash.

Advanced Disposal Services Holiday Schedule

There will be no pickup on the following Holidays:

Christmas Day	New Year's Day	Memorial Day
Independence Day	Labor Day	Thanksgiving Day

Routes will be pushed back one day following a Holiday. For example, if Christmas Day is Monday and your normal service day is Tuesday, you will be serviced on Wednesday that week. Customers who are normally serviced on Friday of that week will be serviced on Saturday.

CHRISTMAS TREE PICKUP

The Town will provide pickup of Christmas trees during the second and third full weeks of January (January 8-19, 2018). Remove bags from trees. Trees with bags, wreaths, lights and garland will not be picked up. Trees should be on top of the snow bank at the edge of the road.

Trees may also be dropped off at the Town Garage, 2811 Two Mile Avenue, or at the Municipal Building, 2410 48th Street South, in the designated drop off areas. All bags, wreaths, lights and garland must be removed from these trees also.

PILING OR PUSHING SNOW ONTO OR ACROSS ROADWAYS

It is illegal for any person or business to allow the piling or pushing of snow or other materials from their private drives or parking areas onto or across any public roadway, thoroughfare or bridge. This is prohibited by WI State Stat. §346.94 (5) as well as the Town's Ordinance No. 4 and carries a fine of \$10-\$100 per incident. Besides being illegal, it can also create a hazard for vehicles traveling the roadways or cause damage to vehicles and snowplowing equipment. This includes snow blowing, especially at the end of driveways. Be aware of oncoming traffic to avoid creating a hazard.



REMINDERS FROM YOUR POLICE DEPARTMENT

BE A CRIME STOPPER: If you have information regarding a crime and would like to remain anonymous, plus be eligible for a reward up to \$1,000, you can contact Wood County Crime Stoppers in one of four anonymous methods:

2018 DOG LICENSES: If you are a dog owner, a reminder to make sure you pay the annual license fee to obtain a license and collar tag for "man's best friend". Per Town Ordinance, this shall be done "at the time and in the manner provided by law for payment of personal property taxes". This also applies to dog exemption permits, those households with more than two dogs. Make sure your dog's rabies vaccination is current prior to coming in and paying the annual license fee.

SNOWMOBILE TRAILS: A safety reminder to all snowmobilers utilizing the snowmobile trails/routes in the Town of Grand Rapids: please stay on the designated snowmobile trails/routes and obey all signs and speed restrictions for your safety and as a courtesy to friends and neighbors' property adjoining those trails and routes. We want everyone to have a safe and enjoyable winter season.

WINTER SURVIVAL ITEMS: Please consider stocking your vehicle with a few winter survival items in case you get stranded along the roadway during the upcoming winter season. Items such as blankets, spare gloves and hats, snack bars, reflective safety markers, hand warmers, etc. are all good items to have with you in case of an emergency. When traveling, make sure your cell phone has a full charge so you can make a call in case of an emergency. Also remember to keep your gas tank over half full to avoid gas line freeze-up, especially during extremely cold weather.

PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE BACK DROP BOX: Reminder, the Town of Grand Rapids prescription drop box is available during normal business hours for residents of the town to dispose of unwanted, unneeded, or expired medications. Please use the drop box to properly dispose of these items so they don't end up polluting the environment or in the wrong hands out on the street. An informational sign is posted by the drop box indicating what items are acceptable and items that are not.



REMINDERS FROM YOUR FIRE DEPARTMENT AND FIRST RESPONDERS



CHANGE YOUR BATTERIES: When you set your clocks back in November, did you remember to change the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors? Also, if your detectors are more than ten years old, it is time to replace them with new ones. A properly functioning smoke detector increases your chances of surviving a fire in your home by 90%.

SNOW REMOVAL: When removing snow from your driveway and sidewalks, remember to pace yourself. Make sure you are well hydrated by drinking a glass of water prior to starting and again when you are done. Keep children away when using a snow blower. The snow blower may pick up a rock, a piece of chipped concrete or even a piece of ice, which can become a dangerous missile. Never refuel a snow blower while it is running or inside your garage. Let the engine cool for several minutes before refueling. Spilled fuel on a hot engine can ignite and cause a fire.

PREVENT ELECTRICAL FIRES: Never overload circuits or extensions cords. Do not place cords and wires under rugs, over nails or in high traffic areas.

ALTERNATE HEATERS: Portable heaters need their space; keep anything combustible at least three feet away. Never leave these units unattended.

FIREPLACES AND WOOD STOVES: Have your chimney or wood stove inspected and cleaned annually by a certified chimney specialist. Clear the area around the hearth of debris, decorations and flammable materials. Keep air inlets on wood stoves open, and never restrict air supply to fireplaces.

CHRISTMAS TREES: Christmas trees are a part of the traditional holiday celebration. If not handled properly, they can cause an extremely dangerous fire threat. A dried out tree can catch fire and burn a living room in just 30 seconds. When buying a live tree, look for one that is not shedding needles. If branches snap when bent, the tree is already too dry. Keep trees watered. A mixture of lemon-lime soda and water will keep a tree moist longer. Keep trees away from all heat sources including fireplaces, room heaters or wood stoves. When the tree becomes dry, discard it promptly. When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label "Fire Resistant".

FREE SMOKE DETECTORS AVAILABLE

If you are in need of a smoke detector, please contact the Grand Rapids Fire Department at (715)424-1815 or visit the Town website at www.townofgrandrapids.org to print out a request form (under Community tab, Forms & Permits). The Fire Department will supply and install up to 3 smoke detectors in your residence at no cost. The detectors are supplied free of charge by the American Red Cross.

EDGE OF ROAD REFLECTIVE MARKERS

The Town of Grand Rapids Board has approved a policy of allowing reflective break-away markers to be placed in the road right-of-way to aid the snowplow drivers in determining the edges of the roads before banks are established. The guidelines that have been established are:

- Only approved break-away markers that are purchased through the Town of Grand Rapids will be permitted.
- Markers must not be placed closer than three (3) feet to the edge of the blacktop.
- Markers must not be placed closer than ten (10) feet from each other.

Any markers not following the above guidelines are subject to removal by the Town of Grand Rapids and/or possible forfeiture as per Road Ordinance No. 19 and Schedule of Fees and Forfeitures Ordinance No. 39. In the use of the temporary snow marker, the residents understand that the Town of Grand Rapids will not be liable for any breakage or replacement of said markers.

Under normal plowing conditions, the crews will do their best to avoid hitting the markers but it is possible that there may be some breakage of the markers should the year's snowfall dictate that the banks be rolled back.

The markers are available at the Municipal Building for a cost of \$2.00 each.
